

The well kown german journal "LP" reports of the PMR's audible and measurable effect in their edition 4/2013:

"So what's that "Passive-Multivocal-Resonator"? It's about a bowl, which is hand manufactured uniquely by a specialized company for HighendNovum. Every bowl is a unicum, because for each unit there has to be pepared a new mold."

"The object looks like what it is, solid craftmanship."

"Firstly: The PMR has got a measurable effect. Secondly: The PMR is working relatively broad-band."

"...Beside his main resonances the PMR evenly radiates sonic energy in a wideband range, especially in the midrange. Therefor the impression that the PMR supports the vocal playback can be supported."

"Thirdly: The PMR focuses. Angle measurements show, that due to his shape the resonator has a preferred direction of radiation."

"What works well: Locating. If one should not be happy with the midth location of the own system, the positioning of the PMR in the middle between both speakers is suggested. Then a prior diffuse sound pattern is focused. The same applies to the correction of a prior unbalanced right-left-balance, for which one simply puts the PMR on the weaker site."

"A certain increase of likely felt overtones can be attested."

"Summarized you can say that the PMR has a proven audible effect. Of course it cannot replace a well arranged hifi system, but on the other hand achieve an obvious sound enhancement."
